The Project

- Identify opportunities to advance the economy of Eastern Ontario that also leverages the ongoing efforts of EOWC
 - EORN, CFDC's OEEDC, EOMC
- Improve the underlying conditions for economic development throughout the region
 - Workforce development, workforce attraction infrastructure, sector specific initiatives
- Generate a series of strategic actions/flagship initiatives at the regional level that enables the creation of jobs, wealth and investment across the region
 - Need uptake at the organizational level
 - Needs to be relevant to the municipalities, business community



Consultation Program

- Success of moving this forward premised on input from a broad based consultation effort
 - Meeting and small group discussions with key stakeholders (120+)
 - On-line surveys for economic development community and business leaders (500+)
 - focus group sessions that will test the major themes (140+)
- Premised on understanding of where local challenges and efforts require a more regional approach
- Broaden the narrative around where the EOWC can show leadership on economic development matters



- 1. Redoubling our efforts on workforce development and attraction
 - Attraction and retention of workers
 - Quality of life in the region isn't what we think it is
 - Finding workers with the 'right fit'
 - Finding people for low-pay, part-time jobs
 - Assisting displaced workers with career transitions
 - Better access to training
 - Opportunities for career progression
 - Need for quality and timely labour market information
 - Sector-specific labour force challenges (e.g. manufacturing, forestry)



- 2. Delivering innovation services
 - Entrepreneurship training and supports (e.g. business mentors)
 - Access to capital
 - Build on sector-based innovations already taking place (e.g. Ottawa Valley wood products)
 - Changing mandates of traditional funders
 - Focus on the supply chain of activities
 - Take a more disciplined approach to provision of incubation space



- 3. Reinventing traditional sectors
 - Perceived industry concentrations vs. reality of local and regional economy
 - Transform tourism sector
 - Value added and niche opportunities in agriculture, forestry and mining
 - Niche and higher value added opportunities in manufacturing
 - Supply chain development (people, materials and transportation)



- 4. Providing the 'right' infrastructure for business
 - Quality and level of Municipal infrastructure varies
 - Consistency of broadband and mobile infrastructure
 - Concept of growth corridors (Hwy 7, 401, 416, 417, 35/115)
 - Education and training services
- 5. Adopting new technologies
 - EORN shifting to technology adoption and business education
 - application of industrial robotics
 - Concept of smart region and smart technologies



- 6. Focusing on Eastern Ontario's energy sector
 - Potential in bio-energy and bio-products
 - Opportunities in energy efficiency
 - Concerns with the supply of electricity in Eastern Ontario
 - Energy pricing
 - Nuclear energy and related supply chain



- 7. Creating a stable and predictable environment to do business
 - Creating environment that helps retain employees
 - Stability and certainty of transportation services
 - Preparing for weather disruptions
 - Local attitudes about business
 - Understanding business needs to stimulate the economy



- 8. Introduce a new regional approach to economic development
 - lack of regional economic development infrastructure/resources for Eastern Ontario (underfunded and fragmented)
 - FEDDEV and CFDC's retooling their mandates for economic development
 - Regional performance should drive economic development planning and programming
 - Marketing efforts need to be refreshed
 - Need for stronger understanding of supply chains for various industries
 - Ontario East has opportunity to refresh/adapt its mandate to changing times
