


- Usually financial tools that stimulate economic development
 - Counties can be added through regulation, new in Eastern Ontario (limited scope)

County Regional Incentives



- County's Official Plan amended to facilitate development of Regional Incentives Programs
 - "County Council may make grants/loans available to local municipalities for the purpose of carrying out Community Improvement Plans throughout the County"
- · Three of the local municipalities had existing CIP's, three did not.



Public consultations held beginning February 2018 across SDG, as well as presentations to each local Council






















- Private sector businesses, non-profits (e.g. Fair Boards) and local municipalities eligible
- Entire County eligible provided local municipality has an approved CIP including the Regional Incentives template
- Funds not allocated per local municipality funds awarded based on merit, regardless of location










Grants only (no loans) – maximum of 50% of element to a prescribed upset

No incremental tax deferrals grants

Brownfield assistance initially considered for funding – rejected due to complexities involved

- Traffic Impact Assessments;
- Market analyses;
- Business plans; and
- Any other study or plan as approved.

Planning Application and Building Permit Fee Grant (up to \$2,500)

- Municipal and County planning application fees, including minor variances, site plans, zoning by-law amendments or official plan amendments; and/or
- Municipal building permit fees or change of use permits.







Implementation Committee

- Review and approve applications, report to Council
- Authority delegated via a Terms of Reference
- Review Committee:
 - · County Warden (Chair)
 - · 2 County staff members
 - 1 staff member from the local municipality where the application is situated (determined by the local municipality)
 - · 2 lay appointees made by County Council







- All County funds paid to local municipality then flowed to successful applicants
- Applicants may be funded by the County and local municipality for different elements of the same project
 - · e.g. local municipality funds signage, County funds large building improvement
 - Purposely designed the funding to double down on good projects without pyramiding on existing local funding









- South Stormont's CIP in place since 2013
- Traditional CIP, focusing on main street and downtown improvements
 - · Façade, building improvement, brownfield, study/fees grants
 - \$175,000 municipal funding supporting \$2.3 million in private sector investment.
 - · Majority of applicants are for retail or restaurant uses



























 - Expands community improvement to uses beyond the retail/restaurants common in downtown areas
- "Big picture" on regional goals vs local CIPs that are typically smaller projects and may only impact immediate area
